SERVICE DIRECTORATE: LEGAL AND COMMUNITY

1. DECISION TAKEN

- 1.1 That the polling districts relating to local government elections are amended to correct some clerical errors, as outlined in Appendix A.
- 1.2 That parish names are added to the existing polling district names to reflect the corrections made to provide greater clarity and easier reference.

4. REASON FOR DECISION

4.1 To ensure that polling district boundaries run coterminous with the various electoral areas at County, District and Parish Council levels, ensuring some clerical inaccuracies are corrected.

5. ALTERNATIVE OPTIONS CONSIDERED

5.1 No alternative options are considered appropriate.

6. CONSULTATION (INCLUDING THE EFFECT ON STAKEHOLDERS, PARTNERS AND THE PUBLIC)

6.1 This was raised and discussed with the Executive Member and Deputy Executive Member for Community Engagement on 11 January and the need to amend historical inaccuracies. This was also raised with all Group Leaders prior to this decision being taken.

7. FORWARD PLAN

7.1 This decision is not a key Executive decision and has therefore not been referred to in the Forward Plan.

8. BACKGROUND/ RELEVANT CONSIDERATIONS

8.1 The recently appointed Electoral Services Manager has identified a number of clerical errors that have occurred with the polling district areas where they were built incorrectly. Polling district areas should not normally cross parish, parish ward, ward, division, or constituency boundaries, and in a limited set of circumstances as identified in Appendix A, there has been a misalignment of those areas with the boundaries.

- The Council conducts a full review of parliamentary polling districts every five years. The most recent compulsory review commenced from 1 October 2018 and concluded on 31 January 2020 (At North Herts it was concluded in October 2019). The polling districts were replotted on the mapping and identified in the Register post that review.
- 8.3 Although polling districts for local government elections are not defined in legislation, in practice they are the same as those set for parliamentary elections.
- 8.4 For the purposes of clarification, the definitions of a polling district, place and station (mirroring the Electoral Commission and The Association of Electoral Administrators Guidance¹) are:

Polling District - the geographical area created by sub-dividing an electoral area. All wards within North Hertfordshire are divided into polling districts, which form the basis upon which the register of electors is produced. Unless there are special circumstances, each parish must be in a separate polling district.

Polling Place - the designated area in which a polling station is located. In the absence of any legal definition, this can be regarded as widely as a polling district or as narrowly as the building in which a polling station is located.

Polling Station - the actual area where the process of voting takes place, e.g. a room in a community centre or school.

- 8.5 Each polling district is allocated with a polling place and polling station which the electors within the given polling district will visit to vote at election time.
- 8.6 This decision fixes the inaccuracies in the areas between polling districts, where some had inadvertently crossed ward or parish boundaries when set after the last full polling district review in 2019.
- 8.7 These incorrect boundaries are to be corrected to run coterminous with the relevant county division, district ward or parish boundary, thereby moving small numbers of properties from an incorrect polling district to the correct one. This potentially affected some electors (46 in the District elections and 13 in the County elections) run in May 2021 (as no elections were held in May 2020 due to covid). This is out of an electorate of circa 99,500. None of these errors would have affected the outcome of the poll and the results, as these are spread over the elections undertaken and have been checked against the relevant election result at the time. This information (candidates elected and numbers) are set out in Appendix A.
- 8.8 The changes do not relate to the allocation of polling places or stations to each individual polling district, which remain at this stage as set during the last full polling district review.
- 8.9 Full details of the changes being made are outlined in Appendix A.

9. LEGAL IMPLICATIONS

9.1. As these changes to the polling district boundaries relate only to local government elections, there is no national legislative procedure. Instead, it is determined by the Constitution of the local council to whom the Electoral Registration Officer / Returning Officer belongs.

9.2. 14.6.8 (b) (x) of the Council Constitution sets out the Service Director delegation powers. Within this, the delegated authority for '*Proposals to vary the boundaries of*

the Borough and Electoral Wards and Polling Districts' falls to the Service Director in consultation with the Executive Member for Community Engagement. Given any potential for conflict this decision is being taken in consultation with the Managing Director, having notified all relevant Executive Members/ Deputy and the Group Leaders. The Managing Director may do so by virtue of his delegated powers under section 14.6.5(a)(iv) in cases of emergency or urgency (where possible in consultation with the Leader of the Council) to carry out any Council or Executive function, power or duty.

- 9.3. Full Council also has a function under 4.4.1 (q) to undertake a (q) "review and agree proposals on polling districts, polling places and polling stations, district boundaries, electoral wards and the number of District Councillors". These are the statutory formal reviews every 5 years required by virtue of The Electoral Registration and Administration Act 2013. The last one was undertaken in 2019 as indicated in the body of the report.
- 9.4. Furthermore, these changes need to be implemented by a re-publication of the Register of Electors. As per 9..5 and 9.6, such a re-publication requires that notification must be made to 2 local newspapers on 13 January 2022 (the Crow and the Comet) to allow sufficient time to publish the amended Register of Electors (see below).
- 9.5. The Electoral Registration Officer (ERO) has the right to publish a revised version of the electoral register as they see fit (Section 13(3) Representation of Peoples Act 1983), i.e. alterations to boundaries caused by an electoral review or a boundary review between local authorities. The ERO is also required to publish a revised open register at the same time. There is no requirement to publish a list of overseas electors.
- 9.6. The ERO is required to publish a notice at the respective local authority office and in a local newspaper 14 calendar days before any such revised register takes effect (Regulation 36 Representation of Peoples Regulations 2001) (RPR 2001).

10. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

- 10.1. The subsequent republication of the Register of Electors has a minor indirect impact on the costs being recuperated for its sale and/or distribution.
- 10.2. The electoral register is available for supply free of charge in connection with electoral purposes; to facilitate the democratic process; and for the purposes of research, security, law enforcement and the prevention and detection of crime.
- 10.3. In addition the Electoral Register may be sold to eligible recipients (i.e. government departments and credit reference agencies) upon publication each year on 1 December, at which point recipients are charged for the full register as of 1 December, and subsequent monthly amendments throughout the year.
- 10.4. The Register of Electors will need to be re-published to reflect the amendments being made to Polling Districts, thereby raising the question of whether the full register should be sold and distributed as is usually the case when it is fully republished.
- 10.5. The current statutory fees for the electoral and open register (Regulations 110 and 111 RPR 2001:

Data: £20 plus £1.50 per thousand entries (or part) Paper: £10 plus £5 per thousand entries (or part)

- 10.6 However, due to the fact that these changes are correcting minor errors on our part, and with consideration for the small scale of the changes being made, it is suggested that no additional charges will be raised and the full Register shall be distributed in the same way that the regular monthly amendment for February would ordinarily have been.
- 10.7 There is also requirement to advertise the republication of the Electoral Register in a local newspaper. The cost to advertise the notice in both the Royston Crow and The Comet is £337.52 + VAT.

11. RISK IMPLICATIONS

- 11.1 If the amendments to the polling district boundaries were not corrected and the Electoral Register re-published could result in some electors voting in the wrong elections, and potentially affect the election results where seats are won/lost by small margins.
- 11.2 Individuals may challenge the result of an election if they believe it was not administered properly via an election petition (which must usually be made within 21 days of the day the election was held).
- 11.3 There are currently two district Councillor vacancies as well as a county Councillor vacancy, by-elections for which can be called at any time prior to the original elections scheduled in May 2022. To not remedy these inaccuracies by re-publishing the Register on 1 February would mean that the Registers used for any future nomination forms would be inaccurate.

12. EQUALITIES IMPLICATIONS

- 12.1 In line with the Public Sector Equality Duty, public bodies must, in the exercise of their functions, give due regard to the need to eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation, to advance equality of opportunity and foster good relations between those who share a protected characteristic and those who do not.
- 12.2 The changes highlighted mean that the affected electorate (and potentially any new dwellings/electorate) will be allocated to the correct polling district and vote in the correct election.

13. SOCIAL VALUE IMPLICATIONS

13.1. The Social Value Act and "go local" policy do not apply to this decision as this is not a procurement exercise or contract.

14. ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

14.1. There are no known Environmental impacts or requirements that apply to these actions.

15. HUMAN RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

15.1 Other than officer time required to identify the initial issues and put together proposals to correct them, there are no impacts.
